

**Documentary Highlights Bollywood-Bound South Asian Canadians** By Preeti Thandi 'Bollywood' is certainly the buzzword in filmmaking today. As savvy cameras roll towards India's fantasyland, Toronto-based director Nisha Pahuja takes an insightful journey to Mumbai in her debut venture 'Bollywood Bound'. Nisha's very first documentary is making news at the Hot Docs Canadian International Documentary Festival with Canada's very own Ruby Bhatia, a celebrity in fantasyland. The film pursues the glittering aspirations of four young Canadians who set out for Bollywood in the hope of living their dreams - Ruby Bhatia from Ajax, Ontario, Neeru Bajwa from Vancouver, Vikram and Vekeana Dhillon from Alberta. Selected as the closing night film at Hot Docs, Bollywood Bound screens on Sunday, May 5, 6:30 p.m. at the Bloor Cinema. the University of Toronto, Nisha started off as a researcher for documentaries working with various filmmakers including her mentor, Ali Kazimi. The idea of making Bollywood Bound was personal to the extent of commenting on the biggest influence for a child growing up. "Every child has a fantasy of a heroic figure," says Nisha who

As the camera zooms into the Bhatia household Ruby watches her mother fry snacks and sits down with her dad to watch her own video, where she interviews superstar Amitabh Bachan. Later in an insightful comment Ruby reveals that she is playing different parts expected of her in life.

Bollywood Bound begins with images of the Mumbai railway station where hundreds arrive everyday in search of stardom. A face in that crowd is Vikram Dhillon who travels all the way from Alberta, Canada with his father, convinced that fame and stardom in the city was his to take. Interestingly, the very first impression of Mumbai throws him off as the much expected glamour is not apparent and Vikram keeps hoping for the nicer part to emerge.

behind. Cold realities emerge as Nisha documents the struggle of Vekeana and Vikram in tinsel town as they continue to send their portfolio to key industry players. Slowly the Canadian dollars disappear and the two are left in dire straits when their mother becomes very sick.

Much persistence from Vikram's agent lands him into a brief dancing sequence in a Govinda movie even as Vikram finds it a challenge to keep in tune with the filmy dance steps.

Later he manages to stick his foot into the door of director Ken Ghosh's office. The screen test however does not go too well and Vikram's own immaturity at acting becomes apparent. Then a call from Shahrukh Khan's office sets hopes surging. Both brother and sister get very excited as Vikram goes in for the much awaited interview for a role in Asoka. His gut feel about the film and the role is negative.

Nisha came across the story of Vikram and Vekeana in the Society magazine and followed it up in Bollywood Bound. Vekeana shares her brother's tribulations. She discovers that despite talent and good looks she would be expected to 'com-

wanted to comment on that fantasy and the whole sense of how movies rooted to India are a huge influence. Nisha wanted to approach Bollywood and also say something about Canada.

The film impacts meaningfully

had no idea that a beauty pageant would change the course of her entire life. Ruby shot to fame as a VJ on Channel V, a music channel. Interestingly, Bollywood Bound takes a look at the spiritual

promise' for the role, which, amongst other things implies revealing outfits. Vekeana however does not take that route to success.

Eventually, Vekeana gets selected as VJ for Channel V. She will be appearing as Delnaz in SNIP, her very first English feature film directed by Sunhil Sippy, grandson of G.P.Sippy.

The story of Neeru is the most realistically felt, as director Nisha takes the journey to India with her. Neeru is star struck as a kid. A runner-up at a Miss India Canada beauty pageant Neeru drops out of school to realize her dreams. Her screen test for a film is pre-arranged from Canada, ironically when she arrives in Mumbai, it keeps getting postponed and actually never hap

pens. After several phone calls she gets to meet and introduce herself to a producer but has to rush back to Canada when she learns that her grandmother is sick. Nisha effectively captures the sense of alienation and emotional turbulence in foreign homeland. Neeru has returned to Mumbai and continues her strife. Vikram is now getting into a directing project. Bollywood Bound closes on a positive and philosophic note as the four aspirants carve their own destiny in fantasyland.

Produced by Karen King-Chigbo, Bollywood Bound is part of the National Film Board's Reel Diversity Program, which encourages first time filmmakers.
